Interview with Miss Roscoe by Tom and Marie, Y6

For this edition of the Emmanuel Express, we wanted to speak to our new Head of School, Miss Roscoe, to find out more about her and the move to Emmanuel.

Which primary school did you go to and what was it like? I went to a junior school in Southampton as I didn't grow up in London — it was called St Mark's and I loved it — it was very caring, and it was very free because we had a big field that we could go on. The teachers were really fun and funny. I remember my favourite bits were racing with my friend through maths questions to see who could do the work the quickest, and I loved the teacher reading to us — Mr Powell — we went through the entire Jeremy James stories, and at the time I thought he was like the BFG since he had big ears!

Interview with Miss Roscoe continued...

But then you work less with the children...

I do work less with the children, that is true – but I have an impact on the whole school – working across the school helping cover the teachers, making big decisions that change things, being able to buy new things for the school like new Chromebooks.

Why did you leave your last school?

My last school was Hampstead Parochial and I was maternity cover for Head of School so I covered her. The school before that was Holy Trinity where I worked for 10 years. After I had my children, my role changed and the opportunity was there to change, and then I heard that Miss Burns was leaving Emmanuel and I thought, that is for me!

What is your favourite thing about Emmanuel school so far?

Oh the children, 100%! The children are wonderful, bright and caring, passionate, and spirited. I also love the staff, we have lots of new teachers this year, but we have all slotted in well and we have an amazing team of staff. Also the opportunities that you pupils have to be part of, such as the Emmanuel Express, the Wellbeing Champions and School council, really make the school very special.

What are you excited about for Emmanuel in the next year?

The Year 6 are going to do brilliantly in your SATs and whilst these are not the be all and end all, I know the class will do really well. It's really fun to prepare for that. I am very excited about your year 6 Production! I also think all the events coming up sound really fun. I love working in a school where the PFE are really strong and do all these exciting events that they run, such as the Christmas fair.

Do you have a pet?

No, my husband and I have a no-pet-pact. I think animals are fascinating but we don't like animals enough to have them as pets. They are a big responsibility.

Do you have any hobbies and what is your favourite?

I love to swim so I am currently doing a challenge to swim the length of the Channel (the stretch of water between England and France) over a number of weeks — I basically have to swim a mile 2-3 times a week which is 64 lengths of the big pool at Swiss Cottage. The other thing I love to do is sing. I am in a choir and we rehearse every week and put on concerts, because I used to be an actress before I became a teacher. I went to drama school and trained in performing arts.

Do you play an instrument?

I am learning to play the trumpet with year 5 and I play the flute and piano.

Which is your favourite subject to teach?

Maths. Because I think it gets a bad name, I think it's really fun, and can be competitive which I like, and creative which people don't realise. I like the juicy problems you can do. I think there is a beauty to the different types of maths, like square numbers and Pythagoras – the way that things tie up beautifully in maths is really cool. I like to fly the flag for maths!

What subject did you enjoy most at school?

Although I did really like maths, I wasn't as good at it as maybe other subjects, and I really enjoyed languages like German.

Why did you change for being an actor to a teacher?

When you are an actor it is not guaranteed that you get work, you go to auditions and you work for a while but then it stops, the show closes for instance, then you have to audition again to be in something else. That can become really disheartening. I had 3 big West End theatre jobs, and then I had 9 months out of work, then a year out of work, and whilst you have things in-between, it is hard to make money. Actors have to often get other jobs, so I thought I could become a supply teacher but when I did my teacher training I got the bug and I found that I would much prefer to be a full time teacher than a part time actor.

Endangered species! By Sarup, Y6



(Vegan) Christmas Biscuits - by Louisa, Y3

Steps:

- 1. Mix the flour, sugar, vanilla and salt in a bowl.
- 2. Add the butter and knead well, with both hands.



Ingredients:

- 300g flour
- 200g (vegan) butter
- 100g sugar
- 1tsp vanilla
- 2g salt
- 3. Form a ball, wrap it in cling film and put it in the fridge for at least 1 hour.



- 4. Knead the dough again and break into 4 parts.
- 5. Roll each part (one after the other) into a flat shape, around ½ cm high.



6. Cut out shapes with cookie cutters.



7. Transfer them to a baking paper on a baking tray.



- 8. Bake for ca 10 minutes at 180 degrees.
- 9. Enjoy!



P.S. In Austria we often eat these for Christmas, but you can really make them all year round!



The history of the piano By Tom, Y6

With the piano being one of the most widely played instruments, a question I think some people would want to know would be how the piano was invented.

There are pianos all over the place: one in the hall, three in the church, and many others in shopping centres and places like St Pancras station. How did it become so popular?

It was invented by Bartolomeo Cristofori in around 1700, mainly because he was angry about how little musicians could control the pitch of an instrument. The piano is similar to many other instruments, such as the harpsichord, the monochord, the organ, the dulcimer and many other ones with odd, long names. Many composers, such as Beethoven and Mozart took advantage of this and switched, while other composers, like Bach, stayed on instruments like the harpsichord, and their compositions were not played on piano till long after their death. The piano use was revolutionised when the era of classical music ended. Why was this revolutionary? This was mainly because it was no longer kept to one genre, but was used in genres like Jazz, blues, soul, and pop.

The popularity of the piano was because of how music became more accessible. In the 1900's you couldn't wake up and want to listen to anything you wanted. But in the 1930's records (vinyls) were mass produced, so music became more accessible, thus people wanting to be able to play what they were listening to, and the songs they were listening to mainly involved the genres I mentioned earlier.

With companies such as Yamaha producing around 100,000 pianos a year, and free music streaming services such as Spotify, the amount of people playing piano, or any other instruments, has massively increased in the last 100 years
