Dear parents and carers,

#### A word on competitions and events

We are lucky at our school to have very enthusiastic and hardworking children, who want to make the most of their gifts and talents. We try our utmost to facilitate our school being represented at as many Camden events and competitions as possible; we know that these are memory-makers for the children, and really do help us to achieve 'Life in all its fullness' for our children, and our staff. We take our responsibility for selecting teams seriously, and consider sporting (or academic) prowess, as well as behaviour, sportsmanship and attendance at other events into account. In an ideal world, we would love to give every child the opportunity to represent the school in every competitive event that we enter, however this is not always possible.

The decision of which children to select is never an easy one and many conversations take place to ensure that choices are fair and just. We also have to consider the level of the competition that the team will be facing and select children accordingly. However, not all children can be selected for all events, and we would be grateful if you would prepare your children for such an eventuality. An important part of this education is to help children to cope with the elements of competition. Winning, losing, fair play, teamwork, selection and non-selection, along with developing respect for coaches and managers are important aspects of this learning process.

#### **School Council**

Our school council have been busy with numerous projects, one of which was on advising Martin Knipe from 'The Playground Company' on their ideas and advice about a new playground structure in the Omega playground. They considered very carefully the aspects of his three potential designs including safety, accessibility for all ages of children, as well as having different kinds of play opportunities such as imaginative and make-believe as well as physical play. They were fantastic ambassadors for our school and I was very proud of them.



#### Uniform

While the heating was being fixed in Spring 1, we invited children to wear layers to ensure their warmth and comfort whilst at school. This has been fixed and the system is able to keep classrooms temperate.

Therefore, from Monday children are now expected to wear correct uniform to school (including summer uniform of dresses and shorts as the weather warms up), but excluding jewellery, trainers (with the exception of on PE days), nail varnish and large hair accessories. #### **Curriculum leaflets**

You should have received your child's curriculum overview for the term on ParentHub, where we detail the topics and skills being covered for the term in all subjects. This term we will be teaching RSE (Relationships and Sex Education) for all classes. These are lessons which are aligned with the curriculum set out by Camden to talk to children in an age-appropriate way in order to:

- Develop positive attitudes, values and self-esteem and challenges negative attitudes and prejudices.
- Make sense of misinformation in the media and from peers.
- Provide an opportunity to talk about feelings and relationships.
- Promote the skills necessary for effective communication and loving, caring, respectful and happy relationships.
- Prepare children for the physical and emotional changes that will take place in puberty.
- Protect children from inappropriate online content and exploitation.
- Teach the statutory part of the science curriculum covering the biological aspects of RSE.

# **Regular Giving**

As we have come to the end of the financial year, we wanted to provide parents and carers with a bit of an update on our financial position and the regular giving scheme.

As costs continue to increase across the sector, we know that the vast majority of one-form entry primary schools like us are predicting deficit budgets for 2024-25. Whilst we are also predicting a deficit, with careful management of our finances and contracts and a keen eye on the efficiency of the school buildings, we are in a better position than many.

Our predicted 2023-24 deficit has also been reduced in part by the generosity of our parents via the regular giving program; a big thank you goes to all of the families who have donated over the past ten months. We currently have 35 families signed up to monthly direct debits, with a total commitment of £1182.85, meaning that the average is £33.79 per family per month. This has meant that we have been able to just about keep provision at the same high level in 2023-24 that Emmanuel has always enjoyed.

Whilst it feels deeply uncomfortable to continue to ask parents for money as the Executive Headteacher and Business Manager of a state school, and also given the very uncertain economic times for many families, if you are in the position to afford a donation, whether that's a one-off or a more regular donation, we would be deeply grateful for your generosity and support to safeguard long-term the additional opportunities that make Emmanuel so special.

We currently have 168 families at Emmanuel with 35 signed up for regular giving. If we doubled the amount of donating families and got close to 50% take-up, then the total annual income to the school would amount to nearly £30,000 (£37,500 with Gift Aid added) which would go a long way to helping us maintain a balanced budget.

If you are a UK tax payer, you can supplement your donation by 25% by completing a Gift Aid declaration when making your donation.

## What to think about:



#### Ways games can benefit children

If your child is a keen gamer, steer them towards games that will help them to develop life skills like problem-solving or supplement their learning.



#### Be aware of game content and themes

It's important to stay on top of what themes are featured in the games they play so that you can be aware of how these might influence their view of the real world.

## What to talk about

### Discuss what they enjoy playing

**Have regular conversations** about the games they play so you can create an environment where they feel they can come to you if something goes wrong.


#### Talk about potential risks

Help them understand the **importance of keeping personal details private** and tell them that not everyone online is who they say they are

### How to cope when things go wrong

If they see something that upsets them or are targeted by another player in a game, it's important to talk about how to handle this situation. Advise them to come and talk to you or a trusted adult for support.





# Things to do

## Set digital boundaries

Use a family agreement to set rules on what they can play, when and how long for to help them strike a healthy balance between gaming other activities they do.

# Use reviews and sites to pick appropriate games

Read parents and expert reviews of games they are interested in to help you choose the right games for them to play.

### Encourage them to play in shared spaces

This is a simple way to stay engaged in what they are doing while gaming and step in if you feel something's not quite right.

# Set privacy settings and learn how to report in-game abuse

Make it a habit to review their privacy settings on their account and teach them where to report in-game abuse so they can take action if they feel concerned.

### Gen-up on the lingo


Get up to speed on how players communicate while gaming to **spot the signs of cyberbullying or negative behaviour.** 

### Make gaming a family affair

**Trying out new games with children** makes it easier to relate and can give you a better sense of what the game is about and prompt conversation or safety measures to help them stay safe.


